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Our 2010-2011 Rotary International President, Ray Klinginsmith, began his Rotary journey fifty years ago

in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, when, as a young Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar, he set sail for a year of study at the University of Cape Town, South Africa. The first student from his small hometown of Unionville, Missouri to study abroad, Ray's life was changed by the experience. Upon his return to the states, he and Judie married and they honeymooned, where his Rotary journey began, in New Orleans. Nearly fifty years later, Ray is the first Ambassadorial Scholarship recipient to become President of Rotary International. From Rotary scholar to Rotary International President, Ray is excited that New Orleans is the site of the 2011 RI Convention because, as he puts it, he will have traveled full circle in both his personal and his Rotary life.

During his time as an Ambassadorial Scholar, Ray began his focus on communities at home and abroad. During his fifty years of Rotary service, his focus on communities continued to develop. It is reflected in the 2010-2011 RI Theme. In selecting the theme, Ray said, "I decided to search for a briefly stated theme that would fulfill two objectives: the first to explain Rotary to non-Rotarians, and the second to validate our work for Rotarians. The words I have selected to describe Rotary's current mission and to highlight its achievements are what we do best, "Building Communities, Bridging Continents."

Our Rotary International President, Ray Klinginsmith, is a man of action and practical vision. Hailing from Missouri, the "Show Me" state, President Ray has endeared himself to the entire class of 2010-11 Rotary Club Presidents and District Governors with his common sense approach to the importance of ba-

sic Rotary principals and the wisdom of "cowboy logic."

The fundamental principals of "cowboy logic" are -

- taking pride in your work
- talking less and saying more
- doing what has to be done, and
- remembering that some things just aren't for sale.

One of those things not for sale is the basic principles of Rotary.

Ray asks all Rotarians to apply "cowboy logic" and Rotary basics to make Rotary clubs bigger, better, and bolder. Addressing the 2010 RI Convention in Montreal, President Ray stated,

I believe the way for Rotary to remain viable and vibrant in the next century is to help our clubs to be bigger, better, and bolder. The clubs are the life and the breath of Rotary. Therefore, it is clear to me that my job is to help the district governors to help the clubs. We can do it, and we will do it, if all of us follow the simple concepts of cowboy logic.

Ray has already demonstrated that he is not afraid to examine the way things are done and break with tradition when there is a better way to do it and when the change upholds basic Rotary principles. It is estimated that a simple change in the way district governor jackets are ordered and delivered saved incoming district governors well over \$65,000. Traditionally, each "class" of district governors wears a blazer in a color that is unique to their class. And, traditionally the color of the new DG blazer is unveiled at the International Assembly held in San Diego, California, in January of their DGE year. DGEs from around the world wait with baited breath to discover the color of the blazer they will

be wearing for the next year, hoping it isn't hot pink or lime green. Once announced, there is a mad scramble to purchase the blazer and have it altered on site before returning home. When Ray looked into this blazer tradition, he discovered that the DGEs could purchase the same blazer for half the price if the blazers were ordered early and shipped to their homes. So, Ray broke with tradition and announced the DG blazer color six months earlier, at the RI Conven-

tion in Birmingham, UK. As a result, not only was the cost cut in half, but we found that instead of focusing on blazer colors and spending time being fitted, incoming governors were able to focus on more important things at this years

International Assembly. Still, the tradition of having a uniquely colored class blazer remained. It was a win-win situation.

While changing the way blazers were ordered is not a monumental change, it is a good example of Ray's philosophy of action and practical vision. He encourages each club and district to look at what we are doing and to ask several questions before we continue to do it the way we have always done it.

- Does it uphold the basic principles of Rotary?
- Is it needed?
- Does it need to be done by Rotary?
- Is this the best way to do it?
- How can we improve it?

Asking some simple questions, upholding the basic principles of Rotary in our decisions, and applying cowboy logic to our actions will help us build bigger, better and bolder Rotary clubs that excel at Building Communities and Bridging Continents in 2010-2011.

OUTBOUND GSE TEAM TO CHILE HAS VACANCIES

When the terrible earthquake struck Chile on February 27th of this year, Rotarians in our GSE partner District 4360, which includes Concepcion, the second largest city in Chile, suddenly faced the monumental task of rebuilding their communities, schools, homes, and infrastructure. Team members must be 25 to 40 years of age and *can not* be Rotarians or related to a Rotarian. Team member applications are due by August 31, 2010.

He has journeyed to Peru in 2005, 2006, 2008, and 2010 for the same purpose. As a former RI District Governor and Officer, he continues to serve as a member of the Past RI Officers for Zone 34. Additionally, he was a member of the RI Nominating Committee to elect Zone Director John Smarge to the RI Board of Directors.

Keith's year as District Governor of Rotary International in 2003 – 2004 allowed him the opportunity to meet and find a friend in RI President Elect Jonathan Majiyagbe and his wife, Ade. President Majiyagbe was the first African elected as RI President. Honey was happy to learn that Ade was an International Officer of Inner Wheel, where Honey is a former member of the only Inner Wheel Club in District 6950. Keith and his wife, Honey, were extremely saddened to hear of Ade's sudden passing during the International Convention in Australia in June of 2003. As a result, Honey pledged to attend all 46 official

club visits with Keith in Ade's honor. She lived up to her pledge, which is quite an achievement!

The District grew and flourished during Keith's reign as District Governor. The district website was improved and email communications were strengthened for all 46 club Presidents and most club Secretaries, saving postage as a result. Centennial projects, as requested by Rotary International, were started where the two Dunedin clubs created a "Visitor Center"

on Honeymoon Island State Park. This center is visited by millions and hosts a Rotary Wheel for all to see. During the same time, the Rotary Club of New Port Richey provided over \$300,000 to build the Rotary Pavilion which also proudly displays the Rotary Wheel.

One of the accomplishments during Keith's reign was the charter of The Rotary Club of East Lake Woodlands. He was extremely proud of the now 47 clubs when 87% of them received a club Presidential Citation. This allowed Keith to be awarded the District Governor's Presidential Citation.

Besides Honey, Keith's other passion is to start new clubs. Keith has been involved in starting seven clubs in the last seven years. Three clubs (Wesley Chapel, San Antonio, and Land O' Lakes) were formed in one year. Two new clubs have been formed this Rotary year (St. Pete Sunset and Carillon).

Without a doubt, Keith has been a true mentor to many, many Rotarians. He and Honey are always ready to lend a hand, lend an ear, provide guidance, build friendships, and always enjoy a good laugh. District 6950 will be forever grateful.
