February is World Understanding month in Rotary, a time to focus our attention on, as well as celebrate, what Rotary has done to promote world understanding and peace. By recalling the Fourth Object of Rotary, you'll be reminded of the importance that the Rotary movement places upon this:

Encourage and foster the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

This Fourth Object shows just how ambitious and lofty are the goals of Rotary! It describes the true ends of Rotary – to advance international understanding, goodwill, and peace. Further, it describes the key elements of our strategy:

- Select business and professional persons who believe in the ideal of service
- Create a united, worldwide fellowship of these people
- Through their activities, advance world understanding.

February is our month to celebrate what Rotary has done in this regard.

In particular, we choose February 23rd, principally because Paul Harris held the very first Rotary meeting on February 23, 1905 in Chicago. I encourage each of our clubs to celebrate World Peace and Understanding Day during your club meeting held during the week of February 20th.

How do you celebrate world peace and understanding? Let me suggest the following possible club programs:

Polio eradication

Have a program about the latest developments in polio eradication. Yes, we are so close to eradicating polio. Our efforts to eliminate this terrible disease are, without a doubt, promoting world understanding.

Matching grant projects

One of the purposes of the Rotary Foundation's matching grant program is to unite clubs from different countries in service. Have a program about a matching grant project in your club or area.

Ambassadorial Scholarships

Each year Rotary awards one year scholarships for foreign study. It is an excellent way to help bridge cultures. This fall we'll be sending an Ambassadorial Scholar from the East Pasco area to Ireland for a year. Consider inviting one of our Ambassadorial Scholars to visit your club.

Youth Exchange

Youth exchange is a wonderful way to help bridge the differences of culture and geography. Consider having a program on youth exchange.

Rotary's Peace Studies program

To help promote world understand-

ing, Rotary has established programs in conflict resolution at major universities around the world. Consider having a club program on this.

Group Study Exchange

Group Study Exchange is another program that helps bridge differences. In April we'll have a GSE team visiting us from Korea. During February, consider inviting the team we sent last fall to Korea so you can hear about the exciting adventures they had.

Water Projects

Various clubs in our district are involved with international water projects. These projects provide much needed help to those suffering from a shortage of clean water around the world, but they also help to promote world understanding. A team from the RC of Wesley Chapel just returned from working on a water project in Honduras and could provide a great program to your club.

These are just a few of the possibilities. The important thing, I think, is to focus attention on how the incredible Rotary network, beginning with the network created within your local club, extending through District 6950 and on to the entire world, makes it possible for us to promote efforts at world peace and understanding. The world is a pretty messy place, but the efforts of the 1.2 million of us who call ourselves Rotarians go a long ways towards making the world a little bit better. So take time during February to celebrate what Rotary is doing to advance international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Now the committee has selected the new crop of three students that will be going to Belgium, Slovakia and Brazil next August when the others return home.

Tinson Nhon from St Petersburg, who is being sponsored by St Petersburg West Rotary Club, will be spending a year in Belgium going to school and learning about the culture. Katlynn Fisher is from Clearwater, will be sponsored by Clearwater Beach Rotary and will be going to Slovakia. Ross Guju from Palm Harbor is being sponsored by 7 Springs Rotary and will be going to the city of Brazilia, the capital of Brazil. These 3 fine young people have agreed to leave their comfortable homes and their families and venture forth to foreign places; and yet they are confident that they will be safe and comfortable in their new environment. The reason is that they are also being sponsored by a Rotary Club in the countries that they are going to and they know that Rotarians are Rotarians regardless of what country they are from. GULF BEACHES ROTARINS - RECYCLE NEW & OBSOLETE TEXT BOOKS

In the beginning, less than 60 days ago, Gulf Beaches Rotarian, Daniel Mannello, proposed that we re-cycle New Text Books made obsolete by the Pinellas School District's use of Kendall Readers at certain Elementary and Middle Schools.

Contacts were made by Rotarian Daniel Mannello. Elementary and Middle School Text Books were identified for recycling. December 23, 2011, our fellow Rotarian passed away unexpectedly, just prior his 46th birthday. This project was continued by his Gulf Beaches Friend in Rotary Mitchell Shenkman.

In only the last 30 days, 6000 books have been collected from the Pinellas School District. Text books on pallets have been loaded into a pick-up driven by Rotarian Mitchell Shenkman. These books have been re-distributed through Guardian Ad Litem Offices for use by children in Manatee, Sarasota and Pinellas Counties.

New text books have been delivered through Eckerd Community Alternatives of Pinellas/ Pasco for children in foster care. Books have also been delivered to Big Brothers Big Sisters. Mitchell has recently made delivery to the Imagine Charter School Campus in St. Petersburg.

In the future Gulf Beaches Rotarian Mitchell Shenkman plans to continue and broaden the scope of this project originally envisioned by our recently departed Gulf Beaches Rotarian, Daniel Mannello. Exploratory contacts have been made in the Virgin Islands and Pakistan who may be able to use the school text books. THE ROTARY CLUB OF CRYSTAL RIVER DO- NATES TO THE CREST PLAYGROUND PROJECT



The Rotary Club of Crystal River donated \$5000 to the Crest Playground Project on Monday January 9, 2012. The Crest school serves students with severe disabilities from all over Citrus county with ages from birth to twenty-two. Students who attend Crest are classified as having an Intellectual Disability or an Emotional Behavioral Disability and under these two disability classifications are students with physical disabilities, autism, conduct disorder, compulsive disabilities, speech and language disabilities and

more. One hundred percent of the students at Crest have some form of disability and twelve percent are in wheelchairs. The current state of the playground makes it hard for the wheelchair bound students to access the play areas and the wheelchair accessible equipment is in disrepair. The Rotary Club of Crystal River's donation is just a fraction of the funds needed to give the children a place to develop their social skills and have outdoor activity. Spearheading the fund raising for the school is Kelly Daugherty, a teacher at Crest. Thanks to a Rotary International grant and the participation of Kings Bay Rotary, The Rotary Club of Crystal River hopes that this donation will be just the beginning of the fund raising for the Crest Playground Project. The Crystal River Rotary participates in many local and international projects such as Upward Bound, the Literacy Project, Stop Hunger Now, Blessings in a Backpack, Imagination Library, the Dictionary Project, and the Children's Christmas Shop to name a few.
